



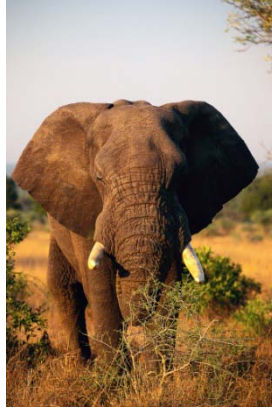

Tuberculosis in Elephants: Science, Myths, and Beyond

A scientific seminar sponsored by USDA-APHIS-Animal Care

Tuberculosis (TB) emerged as a disease of concern for captive elephants in the U.S. in 1996. A TB advisory panel was formed and Guidelines for the Control of Tuberculosis in Elephants were published in 1998 with subsequent revisions in 2000, 2003, 2008, and 2010. In 2008, the TB Committee of the United States Animal Health Association (USAHA) became responsible for the revision of the Guidelines.

This seminar will summarize the current scientifically-supported knowledge of TB in elephants and dispel misinformation about the testing and the disease. Presentations will address diagnosis, treatment, epidemiology, and public health by leaders in the field. Information generated by the seminar will be made available to licensed elephant exhibitors, veterinarians, public health officials, researchers, regulatory officials, industry stakeholders, and the general public using published e-proceedings or other accessible venues.
